DISTRICT BUSINESS

Administrative

The District encourages residents to provide reports of any observed water waste. The District keeps an accounting of leak adjustments as a measure of non-revenue water lost to leaks. This data is compiled and report at the second Board Meeting of the month. April data is the most current data available and is provided below.

In May 2017, NCSD imported 69.3 AF of water over the 31 day period averaging 531 gallons per minute for a daily total of over 765,000 gallons per day. For the eleven months, July through May, the District imported 780.8 AF of supplemental water. NCSD is 47.5 AF over the minimum scheduled take of 733.3 AF for this time period. For Fiscal Year 2017, NCSD is obligated to take or pay for a minimum of 800 AF from the City of Santa Maria ("CSM"). To import this amount of water, NCSD must average 66.7 AF per month from CSM. NCSD is meeting this target.

For May 2017, the community's water conservation effort reached 30.5% and for the year the community reduced its consumption by 31.7% from 2013 consumption levels.

The District's purveyor customers, GSWC and WMWC, each claim 16.66% (cumulatively 33.33%) of the imported water NCSD brings onto the basin through the NSWP. Of the 800 AF minimum imported water from the CSM, 266.6 AF will be credited to these two purveyor customers. The credited amount must be added to the District's groundwater pumping total every month to reflect the groundwater pumped by these customers in-lieu of taking imported water from the District.

The District reduced groundwater pumping by 49.1% for the month of May compared to the 5-year average from 2009 to 2013. Taking into consideration the above referenced purveyor customer credit the District can claim a cumulative groundwater pumping reduction for the first eleven months of fiscal year 2017 of 52.3%. At the current Stage IV level of NMMA's Water Shortage Condition and Response Plan, the District must reduce its dependency on groundwater by 50% for the year, a goal the community has achieved.

Drawing awareness

The Santa Maria Utilities Department awards third-grade artists who crafted water wise posters

A lthough everyone had to shake the dust off of their raincoats for the recent rainfall, the drought still weighs heavy in the minds of those at the Santa Maria Utilities Department. That's why Myra Ritchie, a water conservation specialist with the department, continued the annual Water Awareness Poster Contest despite the wet season.

Third grade students from the Santa Maria-Bonita School District were invited to create posters that explained the importance of water conservation and symbolized Water Awareness Month, which spans the entire month of May. The Santa Maria Utilities Department presented the awards to the group of young winners at the City Council's meeting on May 2.

"I think at third grade they're little sponges," Ritchie said. "Teaching them at a young age about conserving the water they have now, any little tips and ideas that will change water use, will positively impact the future."

The contest has grown tremendously since its first year. In 2010, three elementary schools participated and 45 to 50 posters were submitted. Now in its eighth year, seven elementary schools submitted more than 125 posters to the contest.

The level of competition has increased as more teachers and schools get involved, Ritchie said, making it a great way to reach out to students and to promote Water Awareness Month. Part of her job is to educate students about the water cycle, where water comes

from, and how to conserve it.

"I thought it'd be fun to incorporate a contest for third grade students to see how they'd symbolize water awareness and why water is important in our community," she said.

Competitions like this are important for students to help make them aware and involved with issues within the community and how their actions affect the environment, third grade teacher Bonnie McPeters said in an email to the Sun. One of McPeters' students, Alejandra Aguilar, won third place in the contest.

"Through art, the students are much more engaged and enthusiastic, and were able to have discussions and express themselves in ways they might not by just reading a lesson from a book," McPeters wrote in the email.

Three judges reviewed the posters, focusing on the artwork, the messages the students conveyed, and their understanding of the importance of water conservation.

The winners were Vanessa Cortes in first place, Admarany Garcia in second place, Alejandra Aguilar in third place, and Adolfo Ramos earned the honorable mention. They received trophies, certificates, and prizes including passes to the Paul Nelson Aquatic Center, and tickets to the Santa Barbara Zoo and Six Flags Magic Mountain. O

The Drought Measuring Stick Shows More Conservation Ahead

The mission of the Nipomo Community Services District is to provide its customers with reliable, quality, and cost-effective services now and in the future.

For the communities on the Nipomo Mesa the primary source of water comes from the Santa Maria groundwater basin. As the health of the groundwater basin declines, so does the vitality and economic health of the communities who rely on it.

A healthy groundwater basin provides a more predictable and affordable life. Parks and landscaped areas, when watered and cared for properly, thrive in the Mesa's temperate climate making the area green and inviting. Individuals can wash their cars and water their fruit trees openly without fear of being stigmatized by neighbors as water-hogs. Homes, stores, medical facilities as well as recreation areas all contribute to the vitality of a community and all rely on a sufficient, sustainable water supply.

Drought conditions jeopardize our way of life and force all communities to focus resources on something once taken for granted - water. While some communities in California are celebrating the end of the drought, communities on the Mesa must continue their water conservation efforts. That is because of the Mesa's reliance on local groundwater, not snowpack from the Sierras or rivers and lakes. Locally, the memorable winter rains of 2017 help parched landscapes regain their greenery, but did little to measurably recharge our groundwater basin.

The drought is driving up the cost of water for communities on the Mesa. Native groundwater is the least expensive water for most water agencies to access. The cost to import water usually comes in second and the cost to create clean, healthy drinking water from the ocean is generally the most expensive. As area drought conditions drag on, more import water will be needed because pumping native groundwater is restricted in order to protect the groundwater basin from seawater intrusion. The Nipomo Community Services District imported over 800 acre feet of water. That is only enough water to supply about 2,500 homes with their annual water supply needs.

The Nipomo Mesa Management Area Technical Group (NMMA) was created by the Courts to oversee management of one of three sections of the Santa Maria groundwater basin as a result of litigation started in the 1990s. All three technical groups charged with managing their areas are responsible for providing the Court with an annual report that states the condition of the Santa Maria groundwater basin. NMMA measures how the basin responds to groundwater pumping by gathering and observing well levels. Based on an annual measurement of several specific wells that make up the Key Wells Index (KWI), water users adjust their groundwater pumping as required by NMMA.

NMMA has gathered the well data measurements needed to calculate the KWI and the preliminary results are not favorable. Scientists within the NMMA are busy verifying the preliminary results and will be providing the community with KWI data within the month. If verified at its current level, we have another year of focused water conservation ahead of us. It's not all doom and gloom, but more effort will be needed from Mesa communities to exercise vigilance when it comes to using and protecting our shared water supply. The Nipomo Mesa communities are still feeling the effects of a long dry spell and water conservation is still as important as ever.







More Water for Nipomo - Reservoir Project Completed



The Joshua Road Pump Station Reservoir project was officially completed in May 2017.

The project is a phase of the larger Nipomo Supplemental Water Project (NSWP) which connects the City of Santa Maria's water system with NCSD's. The completed Reservoir increases the District's capacity and will be able to hold 500,000 gallons of water imported from the City of Santa Maria. The Project finished on time and under budget at approximately \$3 million.

The District celebrated this milestone with a public Ribbon Cutting Ceremony on May 24th. Public officials were present at the ceremony and commended the District for their dedication to providing reliable, quality, cost-effective services to customers now and in the future.

The completion of the NSWP will fulfill NCSD's obligation to build pipes and pumps to bring import water onto the Nipomo Mesa. Once complete, the District will have the ability to bring the Court-ordered 2,500 acre feet per year ("AFY") of import water onto the Mesa.

Blacklake Water Reclamation Facility Upgrades Completed



In May, the Board accepted the completion of the rehabilitation project for the Blacklake Water Redamation Facility Headworks. The headworks is the first stage of the treatment process. The project involved the rehabilitation of existing facilities and did not increase capacity. The project was completed on time and under budget.

The Board is currently reviewing a Blacklake Sewer Master Plan which addresses other areas in need of improvement. The Board is scheduled to adopt the Plan this summer after working with the Blacklake community.

The Blacklake Wastewater Collection, Treatment and Reclamation system was initially constructed in 1984 and expanded thereafter by private developers to serve the Blacklake Specific Plan Area. The system was initially operated by the County of San Luis Obispo. The District annexed the Area and assumed operation of the sewer system in 1993. Today the system includes the treatment and reclamation facility, approximately 7-miles of collection piping and three sewer lift-stations. The treated plant effluent is delivered to the golf course for blending and irrigation. Due to the age of the system, staff identified some needed repairs. One of the high priority areas was the headworks of the treatment facility.

Conservation Update

The District's conservation efforts remain steady.

In April, the District produced 143 acre feet or about 46 Million gallons of water to meet customer demand. This equates to a **36.3% reduction** in overall production compared to April 2013. Additionally, thanks to the arrival of supplemental water in July 2015, groundwater pumping during April was **51.6% lower** than the 5-year average for April and therefore met the Stage IV 50% pumping reduction target*.

*In April, the Governor lifted the State-mandated reduction targets. The District is currently in a Stage IV water shortage in accordance with the <u>Water Shortage Response and Management Plan</u>. Information regarding groundwater levels will be available by the Nipomo Mesa Management Area Technical Group early summer.

The Drought Measuring Stick Shows More Conservation Ahead

The mission of the Nipomo Community Services District is to provide its customers with reliable, quality, and cost-effective services now and in the future.

For the communities on the Nipomo Mesa the primary source of water comes from the Santa Maria groundwater basin. As the health of the groundwater basin declines, so does the vitality and economic health of the communities who rely on it.

A healthy groundwater basin provides a more predictable and affordable life. Parks and landscaped areas, when watered and cared for properly, thrive in the Mesa's temperate climate making the area green and inviting. Individuals can wash their cars and water their fruit trees openly without fear of being stigmatized by neighbors as water-hogs. Homes, stores, medical facilities as well as recreation areas all contribute to the vitality of a community and all rely on a sufficient, sustainable water supply.

Drought conditions jeopardize our way of life and force all communities to focus resources on something once taken for granted - water. While some communities in California are celebrating the end of the drought, communities on the Mesa must continue their water conservation efforts. That is because of the Mesa's reliance on local groundwater, not snowpack from the Sierras or rivers and lakes. Locally, the memorable winter rains of 2017 help parched landscapes regain their greenery, but did little to measurably recharge our groundwater basin.

The drought is driving up the cost of water for communities on the Mesa. Native groundwater is the least expensive water for most water agencies to access. The cost to import water usually comes in second and the cost to create clean, healthy drinking water from the ocean is generally the most expensive. As area drought conditions drag on, more import water will be needed because pumping native groundwater is restricted in order to protect the groundwater basin from seawater intrusion. The Nipomo Community Services District imported over 800 acre feet of water. That is only enough water to supply about 2,500 homes with their annual water supply needs.

The Nipomo Mesa Management Area Technical Group (NMMA) was created by the Courts to oversee management of one of three sections of the Santa Maria groundwater basin as a result of litigation started in the 1990s. All three technical groups charged with managing their areas are responsible for providing the Court with an annual report that states the condition of the Santa Maria groundwater basin. NMMA measures how the basin responds to groundwater pumping by gathering and observing well levels. Based on an annual measurement of several specific wells that make up the

NMMA has gathered the well data measurements needed to calculate the KWI and the preliminary results are not favorable. Scientists within the NMMA are busy verifying the preliminary results and will be providing the community with KWI data within the month. If verified at its current level, we have another year of focused water conservation ahead of us. It's not all doom and gloom, but more effort will be needed from Mesa communities to exercise vigilance when it comes to using and protecting our shared water supply. The Nipomo Mesa communities are still feeling the effects of a long dry spell and water conservation is still as important as ever.

Nipomo CSD to Celebrate Completion of Nipomo Supplemental Water Project Reservoir

On Wednesday, May 24th, the Nipomo Community Services District's Board will host a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony to mark the completion of the District's Joshua Road Pump Station Reservoir. The Project completes another phase of the larger Nipomo Supplemental Water Project (NSWP) which connects the City of Santa Maria's water system with NCSD's.

The completed Joshua Road Pump Station Reservoir increases the District's capacity and will be able to hold 500,000 gallons of water imported from the City of Santa Maria. The Project finished on time and under budget at approximately \$3million.

Completion of the NSWP will fulfill NCSD's obligation to build pipes and pumps to bring import water onto the Nipomo Mesa. Once complete, the District will have the ability to bring the Court-ordered 2,500 acre feet per year ("AFY") of import water onto the Mesa.

Sewage plant to blame for funky smell along Hwy. 101 in Nipomo

Nipomo's wastewater treatment plant is smelling less than fresh these days — in fact, some are saying the plant smells a little, well, ripe.

Drivers on

coming from

the area of the Southland Wastewater Treatment Facility south of Nipomo, where the Nipomo Community Services District treats sewage from the town sewer system.

According to the district's director of engineering and operations, Peter Sevcik, the odor is coming from the plant's drying beds, where biosolid, or sludge, is dried out in concrete-lined ditches using evaporation. The dried-out sludge is then trucked to a composter in Santa Barbara County.

Because of the rainy winter this year, the biosolid didn't dry out as it was supposed to, and the district was unable to haul sludge from the beds. This led to a buildup in the eight beds being used. (For reference, each of the beds holds around 7,100 cubic feet — or 201,000 liters.)

The district is periodically mixing the beds in an attempt to speed up the drying process, but the stirring produces that less-than-pleasant odor people have noticed in the vicinity.

Sevcik said the district plans to be able to remove the sludge in the next six to eight weeks.

So maybe consider holding your nose the next time you drive past Nipomo — at least until those things dry out.

What's that smell? How winter rains affected Nipomo's wastewater treatment plant

People living on the south end of Nipomo or driving through on Highway 101 have likely noticed a strong odor lately.

It's coming from Nipomo's Southland Wastewater Treatment Facility.

The treatment plant went into service in 2014, but the strong odor hasn't been a problem until recently.

"Very early in the morning, we get a really bad smell in the area. Sometimes it gets to the point where we just have to close our windows," said Nipomo resident Elizabeth Gomez.

"I've lived in this area for six months now and worked in Santa Maria for two years. I've never once smelled anything this bad," said Nipomo resident Mark Varos.

"Behind me is a gravity belt thickener," described Director of Engineering and Operations Peter Sevcik at the plant on Tuesday. "The water that's coming out of the bottom is water being removed from the biosolids. At the treatment plant, the biosolids are being pumped out to 12 different drying beds and that's what's generating the odor."

The sewage waste dries out on the beds before being hauled away. However, they haven't been able to haul out any of the sludge since October. With the 22 inches of rain this winter, it simply hasn't been able to dry out.

Engineers say the sludge has been sitting in the beds longer than they anticipated, and the smell becomes a problem when the wind blows toward homes.

Engineers say when winds are easterly and not blowing into town, they will dig out the sludge.

"If the wind is blowing in the right direction, then we try to mix the sludge and haul it out," Sevcik said.

They've also looked into other solutions to help speed up the sludge drying process.

"We have looked at bringing in a portable press that would help us dry this stuff faster but the quotes we got are cost-prohibitive so we have to just let mother nature do its thing," Sevcik said.

Once the sludge has dried out, operators will haul it to a compost site. That process is expected to take about 6-8 weeks, so the smell will remain for now.

The Nipomo plant is meeting all permitted limits for emitting clean, clear water and is in compliance with government standards. The smell will just continue to stick around until the sludge dries up.

NIPOMO, Calif. - Sewage has been creating a pungent smell off of U.S. Highway 101 near Nipomo.

The Nipomo Community Services District says customers have been noticing the smell over the past few weeks--most recently over the weekend.

The NCSD says this problem is a result of the heavy rains we had this year which has created a "sludge."

They say every time a truckload removes some of the sludge it has been creating a noticeable smell for people living around the water treatment plant and drivers up and down Highway 101 near Nipomo.

"My goodness it's like if you took a farmer spreading manure.. like three times stronger," Nipomo resident Chris McNabb said.

Chris McNabb was wondering, what the smell is going on?

"It was a pretty stinky one I might say," McNabb said.

McNabb was working on his Nipomo yard when he smelled it this weekend.

"It was different than the agriculture people who used to spread the manure, it was a little bit stronger than that," McNabb said.

The Nipomo Community Services District operates the Southland Wastewater Treatment Facility in town.

"I have to commend Nipomo Community Services, they've been doing a good job," McNabb said

Engineers there tell us a thick sludge has developed from this years heavy rainfall.

"Really a ripe one I must say," McNabb said.

For the past three weeks, since it's been warmer and there's been less rain, they've been laying the sludge out to dry in the sun but when they have to disturb the sludge by mixing, drying or hauling it away to a composter, it's been putting out that stench.

Three-year Drought Emergency Lifted, County Calls for Continued Conservation

San Luis Obispo County no longer faces a local drought emergency, but the region still faces local imbalances in water supply and demand, officials say.

The County Board of Supervisors agreed during its public meeting on May 23 to adopt a resolution terminating the proclamation of local drought emergency made on March 11, 2014.

"Although the local emergency has been lifted, it will take us years to fully recover from the five-year drought," said County Administrative Officer Dan Buckshi. "There are ongoing imbalances in water supply and demand that affect our local communities. That is why we must continue to make water conservation a part of our daily lives."

The region has gone from the most intense drought rating in March 2014 to the least intense drought rating in May 2017, according to a County staff report. Frequent, large storms this fall and winter eased drought conditions in SLO County and across California. As a result, local reservoir levels have increased, but groundwater supplies have not fared as well.

"Because most areas of SLO County depend on groundwater for everything from irrigation to drinking water, we face a significant challenge in sustainable groundwater management," said County Administrative Analyst Lisa Howe, who led the County's Drought Task Force. "As water issues persist in our region, County staff and elected officials will continue to forge ahead and develop solutions for the community."


Ending the local emergency proclamation is consistent with <u>Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr.'s April 7 action</u> to end the drought state of emergency in most of California, Howe said.

On March 11, 2014, the Board adopted a resolution proclaiming a local emergency due to drought conditions in the county. Immediately afterward, County Administrative Officer Dan Buckshi formed a Drought Task Force to coordinate activities to address drought impacts locally.

In the past three years, the Drought Task Force took more than 30 actions to address the drought, with a focus on six key areas:

- 1. Helping local farmers receive financial assistance from the federal government via a USDA Secretarial Disaster Designation.
- 2. Monitoring retail or wholesale water supply services provided by the County.
- 3. Reducing water usage at County-owned facilities, which helped save an estimated 4,500 gallons of water per week.
- 4. Raising public awareness about water supply issues and encouraging water-reduction activities in local communities.
- 5. Providing the Board of Supervisors with an update on drought conditions every 30 days, for a total of 47 reports, to review the need for a continued emergency.
- 6. Reducing the increased fire danger posed by dead and dying trees across San Luis Obispo County.

Prior to the prodamation, San Luis Obispo County had experienced below normal levels of precipitation for the previous three rainy seasons. This significantly impacted the community in a variety of ways, including reduced agricultural production, drinking water shortages, declines in water quality, threats to wildlife, and fire



dangers. It was due to these conditions and related concerns that the Board of Supervisors proclaimed a local emergency on March 11, 2014.

The County will continue to focus on long-term actions to address the continued water supply and demand imbalances. Those actions include:

- · Creating plans for how to best utilize our surface water (reservoirs)
- · Conducting studies to identify options for additional water supply to the County
- Pursuing Proposition 1 grant funding opportunities for water supply projects
- Coordinating efforts to meet the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) requirements

NIPOMO, Calif. - On Wednesday, community leaders from San Luis Obispo County, Nipomo, and Santa Maria hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony for the new Joshua Road Pump Station Reservoir.

This new reservoir will provide the Nipomo area with a more sustainable water source as it holds 500,000 gallons of imported water from Santa Maria.

The Joshua Road Pump Station connects the Nipomo Community Services District with the distribution system from Santa Maria.

The groundwater basin has been at a severe criterion for the last several years and the Nipomo Community Services District is required to provide an import source to manage it.

Planning for the Nipomo Supplemental Water Project began back in the 1990's and still isn't all the way completed.

Their next step is to continue the pipeline structure which will allow the NCSD to fulfill their 2,500-acre-foot annual water requirement.

A part of the Nipomo Supplemental Water project was completed Wednesday with a ribbon cutting ceremony.

The Joshua Road Pup Station Reservoir is part of the project to connect water from Santa Maria to Nipomo. The reservoir increases the district's capacity to 500,000 gallons of water. But officials still need to work on enlarging the piping system to the Nipomo Mesa accommodate the extra water.



"We will be eventually bringing in 2,500-acre feet per year," said Dan Gaddis, the director of the Nipomo Community Services District Director. "This reservoir allows us right now to bring in 800-acre feet per year."

The project is expected to completed in 2025 and is expected to cost \$30 million.
