To meet the District's target of bringing a minimum of 645 acre-feet of supplemental water into the community for fiscal year 2015-16, the District must maintain an average of 53.75 acre-feet/month. Table 1 – Total Production shows the District imported 56.2 acft in March, bringing the YTD total to 486.6 acft through the SWP. For the remaining 3 months of the fiscal year, the district will import 53 acft/month. By doing so, the District will achieve 159 acft of supplemental water and reach the fiscal year objective of 645 acft of imported supplemental water.

The District's State-mandated reduction goal is 28% month to month and cumulative. The community exceeded the State-mandated reduction goal by 10% for the month of March, and the cumulative by 4%.

Due to the Spring 2015 Key Wells Index results, NMMA public water purveyors (NCSD, Golden State WC, and Woodlands Mutual WC) are required to reduce groundwater production by 30%. The District remains in a Stage III Shortage conditions. While the month of March saw a small increase in consumption over February, the community's water use was close to the five-year average, exceeding it by 1.5%. Year to date, the community's conservation efforts are on target to meet a 30% demand reduction.

SPRING TUNE-UPS

The mission of the Nipomo Community Services District is to provide its customers with reliable, quality, and cost-effective services now and in the future.

Spring is in the air! Now that the clocks have been changed, have you checked to make sure your irrigation timer is set appropriately? Spring is a great time to give that sys-

tem a look-over and make any needed adjustments.



It is also a great time to walk around your property and check for any leaks. The District reads water meters once every two months for billing purposes. If a leak develops on the customer side of the meter and goes undetected until the next regular meter read, large of amounts of water could be consumed by the customer leading to large water bills.

Most large leaks involve landscape irrigation systems - including lateral lines to remote hose connections. On this sand dune we affectionately call 'The Mesa', water infiltrates very quickly and even large leaks can go undetected. Many smaller leaks or simply over-watering occur routinely in many homes.

Inside the home, toilets are often "silent leakers" and can go undetected. The District has some toilet tabs available that will help you check your toilets. Another tough-to-detect leak can occur within water softener equipment when flushing of the system occurs excessively or continuously. A customer's best defense against overwatering or a major water leak and a devastating water bill is knowledge. If you have an irrigation system or water softener, make sure someone in the home is familiar with the operation and is checking and making seasonal adjustments. Being aware of your typical household water use will help you know if and when the use is up unexpectedly. The water meter at your property is a tool that can help you determine if a leak has developed in your system. The District has helpful information on how to read the meter. Visit us online or stop by the office.



A message from the General Manager



Where will you be 20 years from now? This is a real question that urban water suppliers are compelled to answer in their Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP). As a community, it's reassuring to know that someone is thinking about our ongoing and future needs, whether it is roadways, water, or retirement.

As your new General Manager, my goal is to reach out to Nipomo community

members and develop relationships so I can understand the community's utility needs. The UWMP provides a great opportunity for us to have conversations about water. You'll find details in this newsletter on how you can participate.

You'll also find me at the <u>St. Joseph Spring Festival</u> at St. Joseph Parish (298 S Thompson, Nipomo) on Sunday, May 1st from 9am - 4pm. The weather has been great so far this spring season so there's no reason to stay inside.

Then there is the Nipomo Chamber of Commerce's <u>Olde Towne Nipomo Spring</u>

<u>Faire</u> (Tefft St in Olde Towne Nipomo) on Saturday, May 21st from 10am - 5pm.

As we look to gain insight into community members, myself and District staff will continue to attend public outreach programs like the UWMP and community events this spring. Both community events mentioned above are free and open to the public.

While I may not know where I'll be in 20 years, I know where I'll be Sunday, May 1st and Saturday, May 21st. I encourage you to stop by, say hi, and pick up some informational materials.





March Conservation Steady

The District's conservation efforts in March were steady thanks to customers' great work. March saw some spring rains, but the area still remains in severe drought status.

In March, the District produced 114 acre feet or about 38 Million gallons of water to meet customer demand. This equates to a **38.2%** reduction in overall production compared to March 2013. Additionally, thanks to the arrival of supplemental water in July 2015, groundwater pumping during March was **63.5%** lower than the 5-year average for March!

The District continues to be in Stage III of its Drought Response and Management Plan and conservation efforts are still encouraged. Keep up the good work, Nipomo!



2015 Urban Water Management Plan

The District is currently in the process of developing its Urban Water Management

Plan (UWMP).

What is it?

Every five years, the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) requires that water suppliers like the Nipomo CSD, update its Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP).

Every urban water supplier that either provides over 3,000 acre-feet of water annually, or serves more than 3,000 urban connections is required to assess the reliability of its water sources over a 20-year planning horizon, and report its progress towards a 20% reduction in per-capita urban water consumption by the year 2020.

DWR staff then reviews the submitted plans to make sure they have completed the requirements, then submits a report to the Legislature summarizing the status of the plans.

Why?

Urban Water Management Plans (UWMPs) are prepared by California's urban water suppliers to support their long-term resource planning, and ensure adequate water supplies are available to meet existing and future water demands.


The Nipomo CSD is partnering with an engineering firm and local agencies to prepare the plan. Preparation of the plan includes analysis of projected population growth, current and future water demands, as well as water supply and pumping data.

How can I get involved?

- 2. Hear a presentation of the UWMP at the District's Regular Board Meeting on May 25, 2016.

Water purveyors exceed conservation goals in March

Water purveyors across the Central Coast had an easier time meeting their conservation mandates in March than in the previous month, as the region largely exceeded expectations.

Water conservation mandates follow Gov. Jerry Brown's November 2015 executive order directing the State Water Resources Control Board to extend emergency conservation regulations into 2016 as the drought continued.

The mandated reductions are based on the amount of water various purveyors used in 2013.

In the South County, conservation figures were deep in the green.

Arroyo Grande led the way, conserving 43 percent compared to its water use in March 2013. The city was handed a 28-percent goal by the state.

Nipomo Community Services District was next, reducing water use by 38.2 percent, according to NCSD figures. The district's state-mandated goal is also 28 percent.

Also in Nipomo, Golden State Water Co. saved 37 percent, which company officials said exceeded its reduction goals.

But Grover Beach exceeded its conservation mandate by the greatest amount, reducing use by 35 percent compared to its 8-percent state goal.

Pismo Beach achieved a 27.32-percent reduction, compared to its 22-percent mandate, which was lowered 2 percent by the state.

The city's previous conservation mandate was 24 percent, but it only achieved a 13percent reduction in February.

In Santa Barbara County, Golden State customers saved even more than they did in Nipomo, exceeding state goals by cutting water use 42.3 percent.

March water savings in Santa Maria rebounded considerably after a dismal February.

Santa Maria has a 16-percent state mandate but managed to save 22 percent in March, city officials said.

In comparison, Santa Maria residents were only able to conserve 6 percent in February.

Lompoc achieved a 23-percent reduction, almost twice its 12-percent mandate and more than double the 11 percent the city conserved in February.

In the Santa Ynez Valley, the smaller purveyors have the option to either conserve 25 percent or limit irrigation to two days a week.

Solvang did both in March and posted a 30-percent reduction compared to 2013, city officials said. In February, the city didn't save any water at all.

However, Buellton had a tougher time, saving just 12 percent compared to 2013, city officials said.

Recreational Trail Immunity

Teresa Burgueno, et al. v. The Regents of the University of California

Court of Appeal, Sixth Appellate District (Certified for Publication: Jan. 13, 2016)

A public entity is generally liable for an injury caused by a dangerous condition of its property if the plaintiff establishes that the property was in a dangerous condition at the time of the injury and the public entity had actual or constructive notice of the dangerous condition. (Government Code §§ 835, 835.2) Section 831.4[3] however, precludes governmental liability for injuries caused by the condition of (a) Any unpaved road which provides access to fishing, hunting, camping, hiking, riding, including animal and all types of vehicular riding, water

sports, recreational or scenic areas or (b) Any trail used for the above purposes. The purpose of immunity for recreational activities on public land is to encourage public entities to open their property for public recreational use. This case addresses whether the immunity applies to a trail on public land that is used for both recreational purposes and non-recreational purposes.

Adrian Burgueno was a fulltime student at the University of California, Santa Cruz ("UCSC") in February, 2011. He lived in an offcampus apartment and commuted to the university on his bicycle. His route to campus included traveling on the Great Meadow Bikeway (the "Bikeway"), a paved bike path than runs through a portion of the UCSC


campus. Constructed in 1973, the purpose of the Bikeway is bicycle transportation to and from the central campus that is separate from automobile traffic. Some bicyclists use the Bikeway for recreation. Members of the Santa Cruz County Cycling Club use the Bikeway to access mountain bike paths in the redwood forests above the university campus. There have been a number of bicycle accidents on the Bikeway. On February 10, 2011, Adrian rode his bicycle to his photography class. As he was leaving the campus that evening on his bicycle, he was fatally injured in a bicycle accident on the downhill portion of the Bikeway. Adrian's mother and sister filed a wrongful death lawsuit against the Regents of the University
