#### **GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT**

#### ITEM

Standing report to your Honorable Board -- Period covered by this report is August 6, 2017 through August 19, 2017.

#### **DISTRICT BUSINESS**

The District encourages residents to provide reports of any observed water waste. The District keeps an accounting of leak adjustments as a measure of non-revenue water lost to leaks. The June data is current for the month and cumulatively for the fiscal year.

In July 2017, NCSD imported 86 AF of water over the 30 day period averaging 628 gallons per minute for a daily total of 903,974 gallons per day. For fiscal year 2017-18, July through June, the District must import 800 AF of supplemental water. To import this amount of water, NCSD must maintain an average of 66.7 AF per month from the City of Santa Maria.

For July 2017, the community's water conservation effort reached 25.2%.

#### 3) NCSD GW Reduction

The District's purveyor customers, GSWC and WMWC, each claim 16.66% (cumulatively 33.33%) of the imported water NCSD brings onto the basin through the NSWP. Of the 800 AF minimum imported water from the CSM, 266.6 AF will be credited to these two purveyor customers. The credited amount must be added to the District's groundwater pumping total every month to reflect the groundwater pumped by these customers in-lieu of taking imported water from the District. Table 3 below demonstrates the calculus for determining the District's groundwater reduction.

Taking into consideration the above referenced purveyor customer credit the District can claim a groundwater pumping reduction of 47.2% for the month of July compared to the 5-year average from 2009 to 2013. For the first month of the fiscal year, the cumulative groundwater pumping reduction is equal to July, 47.2%. At the current Stage IV level of NMMA's Water Shortage Condition and Response Plan, the District has targeted groundwater reduction level of 50% for the year.

The Dana Adobe or "Casa de Dana" is a historic building in Nipomo. It was the home of Boston sea captain William Dana, who in 1837 was granted the 37,888-acre (Rancho Nipomo in Southern California. Captain Dana hosted figures such as Henry Tefft and John C. Fremont in his Nipomo home, which also served as an important exchange point on California's first official mail route between Monterey and Los Angeles.

The photograph that has become known as "Migrant Mother" is one of a series of photographs that Dorothea Lange made of Florence Owens Thompson and her children in February or March of 1936 in Niporno, California. Lange was concluding a month's trip photographing migratory farm

I would like to congratulate the Dana Adobe Cultural Center and Arts & Business Coalition with SCVC for receiving Infrastructure/Beautification Grants from San Luis Obispo County. 

## NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING - WATER RATE INCREASE

This is a notice to explain proposed increases in water rates for the Nipomo Community Services District ("NCSD" or the "District") and the majority protest procedures. The proposed rate increases will be recommended for adoption by NCSD's Board of Directors at the Public Hearing described in this Notice. See the back page of this Notice for Public Hearing date.

#### Dear Owners of Record and Customers of Record,

Nipomo Community Services District (District) depends upon water user fees to fund operating and maintenance costs, to rehabilitate and replace equipment and infrastructure for the water distribution system, and to purchase supplemental water. The District is fully committed to serving existing and future generations of residents in the most efficient manner possible, while protecting both public health and the environment.

The proposed Water Division rate increase is needed to ensure that the District has sufficient revenues to fund operating and capital needs and provide appropriate levels of operating, capital, and emergency reserves. The District's last rate increase in the Water Division became effective on November 1, 2015 and was based on a 5-year rate study adopted in September 2010. The last rate increase for supplemental water became effective July 1, 2017.

Additionally, there are inflationary factors that put pressure on the cost of import water from the City of Santa Maria via the Nipomo Supplemental Water Project as well as supplies and services needed to operate and maintain the water system.

#### Multi-year approach to setting rates

By taking a multi-year approach to rate-setting in meeting long-term infrastructure repair and improvement needs as well as delivering day-to-day services, the District can better prepare for the future and avoid significant unexpected rate increases. For this reason, the District is proposing rate increases for the next five years. It is important to note that if subsequent annual reviews of revenues and expenses show that future rate increases are not needed or can be adopted at lower amounts, the Board of Directors can postpone or adopt a smaller increase. However, the Board cannot approve rate increases beyond those proposed in this notice without an additional Proposition 218 notice to all of its customers.

#### **Proposed Water Rates**

The proposed rates would eliminate tiered rates and, instead, impose a uniform rate per unit used. The rate per unit would be the same for all users. Additionally, the proposed rates would eliminate the separate Supplemental Water rates. These rates would be included in the bimonthly rates. The proposed rates will go into effect December 1, 2017. Subsequent year increases, and a breakdown of rates can be found on the following page.

#### **HOW TO PROTEST**

The following persons may submit a written protest against the Proposed Water Rate Increase to the District's Clerk before the close of the Public Hearing.

- An owner(s) of property (parcel(s)) ("owner of record") receiving water service from the NCSD Water System. If the person(s) signing the protest, as an owner, is not shown on the last equalized assessment roll as the owner of the parcel(s) then the protest must contain or be accompanied by written evidence that such person signing the protest is the owner of the parcel(s) receiving water service;
- "Customer of record" (Tenant(s)) whose name appears on the District records as the customer of record for the corresponding parcel receiving water service from the NCSD.

A valid written protest must include:

- 1. A statement that it is a protest against the proposed water rate increase;
- 2. The name of the record owner or customer of record;
- 3. The identity of the affected parcel by assessor's parcel number or service address;
- An original signature (not photocopy, email, or fax copy) of the record owner or customer of record of the identified parcel; AND
- 5. The date the written protest is signed.

One written protest per parcel shall be counted in calculating a majority protest. Written protests will not be accepted by email or by facsimile. Verbal protests will not be counted in determining the existence of a majority protest.

Written protests regarding the water rate increase may be personally delivered to the NCSD Office located at 148 South Wilson Street, Nipomo during regular office hours (8a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Monday - Friday, excluding holidays), placed in the drop-box located in the parking lot of the NCSD Office, or mailed to:

To be counted, the written protest must be received by the close of the Public Hearing on October 11, 2017, including those mailed to the District. No postmarks will be accepted; therefore, any written protest not actually received by the close of the Public Hearing, whether or not mailed prior to the Public Hearing, will not be counted.

A representative may sign the written protest on behalf of an owner of record or a customer of record provided the representative attaches to the written protest, written documentation/authorization, with original signature, to act in such capacity.

If valid written protests are presented by a majority of owners of record and/or customers of record of parcels receiving water service within the NCSD's Water System, then the NCSD will not adjust/increase the water rates. Only one protest per parcel will be counted in determining whether or not a majority protest exists.

is opened. But a solution to how North County residents will get back home at night, Lavagnino said, has not been found.

"I think it's the sheriff's responsibility. It's part of the whole jail environment, so I think he's the best person to determine who will be the vendor," Lavagnino said. "It's not a budget thing; it's not a money issue. It's getting [a cab company] that will step up and do it. I know they've talked to Uber and that didn't work either."

#### A fresh start

Two days and two phone calls. That's what it took for jail ride program founder Marin to find another cab company willing to sign a contract and take part in the jail ride program.

Marin said he doesn't understand why the jail ride program has never been treated as a priority by the Sheriff's Office or by the community.

"They're used to thinking of lawbreakers as being antagonists. So why should they be nice to them?" Marin asked. "It's odd to me. I don't know why people think it's OK for indigent people to walk 5 to 7 miles back to town in the rain."

Marin said the ride program is likely to start back up in the near future, thanks to 1st District Supervisor Das Williams and his staff; Blue Dolphin Cabs of Santa Barbara; and the Good Samaritan Shelter, a nonprofit organization with locations in Santa Maria and Lompoc that Marin said agreed to help run the new ride program. Good Sam was also involved with the former program.

A nonprofit is required to help the Sheriff's Office run the program for insurance reasons, Marin said. Blue Dolphin will sign a contract with Good Sam, and Good Sam will provide the appropriate insurance and pay the cab company

to make several nightly stops at the jail. Then at the end of each month, Marin said the Sheriff's Office will reimburse Good Sam.

"The Sheriff's Office could have done this, and they didn't for some reason I don't understand," Marin said. "The jail has had its budget cut and they struggle to keep up with everything. You often can't separate inefficiency from intentionality."

But the contract isn't signed yet. Cameron Schunk, media advisor to Williams, said a formal discussion between the cab company, Good Sam, and the Sheriff's Office has not been carried out but a meeting will be scheduled as soon as possible.

Schunk said the program's restart date should be set once all parties meet.

Ken Taylor, the owner of Blue Dolphin Cabs, said he helped Rock Star Transportation with the original jail ride program. Rock Star was a limousine company, Taylor said, so when it needed cabs for the jail ride program, Taylor's cabs would make nightly stops at the jail.

Taylor said he was one of the few people who knew Rock Star was going out of business in January. He said he agreed to take responsibility for the jail ride program and told the Sheriff's Office to call his billing department to work out a deal. That was months ago.

He said his billing department never received a phone call.

This, Taylor said, could possibly be because of the company's recent merge with Yellow Cab in Ventura. The billing department, based in Santa Maria, had several new employees at the time. Maybe the phone call was lost in the mix of inexperience, he said.

Now, he's waiting patiently for the final meeting to sign the contract. Taylor said he doesn't know why other transportation companies would hesitate to take over the program.

"We're in the taxi service business," Taylor

said. "The more business we get, the better."

Until the contract is signed, Lights On will remain one of the only services provided to detainees released at night. Volunteer Bowis estimated that an average of 15 people are released each weeknight and that the number of North County residents passing through has increased drastically since Santa Maria's jail closed.


Bowis said he's helped people from Lompoc and Santa Maria who don't speak any English, women released alone in the middle of the night, and homeless people who don't have anyone to call.

Many of the people released at night are alcoholics who need treatment rather than jail time, and Bowis hopes to open a rehabilitation facility for frequent detainees in the future. For now, Bowis said he'd like to see people like Dan, a physically disabled homeless man who was released from jail just before midnight, treated with a little more compassion.

"It's a human right," Bowis said. "They got picked up somewhere and taken here, right? So the courteous thing would be to bring them back." O





# Nipomo CSD takes new steps to minimize odor from wastewater plant

The Nipomo Community Services District says an odor problem caused by its wastewater treatment plant should soon be resolved.

Engineers say they've removed all of the old sludge that was causing a problem before, and they bought new equipment that should help in the future.

However, some neighbors disagree.

"It goes directly to us. Oh, we smell it every day," said Kathy Goularte's, whose home sits across the freeway from the town's wastewater treatment plant.

"The smell is putrid. I mean, it's horrific," she said. "You literally feel like you live in paradise with your head in the sewer."

Plant engineers say they've found a solution to dry out the sludge beds more quickly, with a compost aerator. The equipment is used daily to introduce oxygen into the sludge. Engineers say it reduces pathogens, odor, flies and they say it cuts down the drying time.

"Instead of taking 9 to 12 weeks, we estimate that it's going to be somewhere in the neighborhood from 4 to 6 weeks," said Peter Sevcik, Director of Engineering and Operations for the Nipomo Community Services District.

The town got approval Wednesday night to buy the \$110,000 machinery that they say will minimize odors and cut drying time in half.

But Goularte and her neighbors are worried about long-term solutions and what will happen this winter when the rain keeps the sludge wet. She's has been emailing back and forth with multiple California agencies to try and come up with odor blocking solutions.

"So we vacation rental our home and we've actually had about three or four complaints," Goularte said.

She says the complaints about bad odors from her guests are hurting her business.

"How do you explain that that's not your property that is smelling?" Goularte said.

She also has half-finished plans of putting in a pool on her property, but said, "We don't even have the desire to finish it because the smells are so bad, who wants to lay out in the backyard and smell sewer while they're enjoying the pool?"

"We still recognize that we are a wastewater plant and there are odors that come from the plant on occasion. We're doing the best we can now and we have invested money to buy additional equipment so that that we're a good neighbor to everybody around us," Sevcik said.

Engineers say they have made significant operational changes at the plant. However, they are still investigating wet weather options. They say they've looked into covering the beds to minimize the odor, and adding more machinery, but that could cost upwards of \$700,000.

The Nipomo Community Services District says it will gladly look into any complaints residents have about foul odors around their homes. The district is also hiring an additional wastewater operator at the plant.
