Legislative Mandate

- To encourage the orderly formation of local governmental agencies
- To discourage urban sprawl
- To encourage preservation of agricultural lands
- To promote efficient local government services



Legislative Compromise

 Created in 1963 - No Statewide Commission or agency

A LAFCO in each county

Local Control over boundary decisions

 LAFCO independent in 2001; separate from the County

What does LAFCO do?

- Incorporations: Nipomo and Cambria most recently studied incorporation
- District Formations: Most recent was Ground Squirrel Hollow CSD for roads only. Cayucos voted down a CSD in 2004. Water Districts
- Dissolution: CSA 17, Creston Hills Ranch CSD, Cayucos Fire Dept.
- **Disincorporation:** very rare One or two state wide
- Annexations: To Cities and Districts. Several annexations on radar;
- Detachments: On occasion-but not very often
- Outside User Agreements to serve a property or area outside the service area of a jurisdiction.
- Updating Spheres of Influence-Municipal Service Reviews all jurisdictions
- Activate Latent Powers of a District

Independence-LAFCO Hat


The Legislature calls upon all commissioners to take off their county, city, or special district hats and sit as members of LAFCo: *Independent Judgment*








LAFCO Balancing Act

Memorandum of Agreement NCSD and County

- Approved by NCSD/County July 2010
- Provides for interagency cooperation
- Project referrals to the NCSD by the County
- Recognizes specific plan for Canada and Southland areas
- Calls for SP to be prepared and adopted prior to annexation to the District - 6.h.
