We would like to know whether other CSDs have ever, or are currently, reading written public comment aloud at their board meetings.

We read aloud any public comments during COVID as well. We now employ the following policy for written public comments and include it on our agenda:

The public may also comment by sending an e-mail to publicomment@ stopwaste.org. Written public comment will be accepted until 3:00 p.m. on the day prior to the scheduled meeting. Copies of all written comments submitted by the deadline above will be provided to each board member and will be added to the official record. Comments will not be read into the record.



A: Yesenia Parra, Administrative Services Office, Santa Cruz County Regional Transportation Commission

We receive written public comments, they are noted on a list we call "correspondence log" then we link the actual comments to the log. This is an Item noted on each agenda and the correspondence log is uploaded to the meeting web page. It is available to all. A: Adam Cox, General Manager, Indian Valley Community Services District

Although there's no legal requirement to read submitted public comments, we used to make an effort to do so, particularly during the height of COVID. I know of some agencies that still use Zoom for their meetings and only allow staff or parties directly involved with agenda items to comment. In our case, we've transitioned to using CivAssist agenda and minute software, which allows the public to comment directly on specific agenda items. Staff receive



2024 Water Distribution System Improvements




• Scope included 4600 linear feet of 12 inch diameter waterline in Pomeroy Road, 425 linear feet of 8 inch diameter waterline in Sea Pines Place, 770 linear feet of 4 inch diameter waterline in Red Oak Way, and 325 linear feet of 8 inch diameter waterline in Mallagh Street

 - Contractor R. Baker, Inc.
 - Notice to Proceed issued January 2025
 - Scheduled completion July 2025
 - Actual completion June 2025
 - Contract cost \$2,019,261


 Scope involves construction of three interconnect stations with flow meters, flow control valves, control panels, radio towers and related instrumentation

 Blacklake Sewer System Consolidation Project Lift Station Improvements and Blacklake WRF Decommissioning




• Scope includes construction of new Blacklake Lift Station, Replacement Woodgreen Lift Station and decommissioning of Blacklake Water Reclamation Facility

Projects in Construction

- Blacklake Sewer System Consolidation Project Lift Station Improvements and Blacklake WRF Decommissioning
 - Contractor Spiess Construction Co, Inc.
 - Notice to Proceed issued August 2024
 - Scheduled completion November 2025
 - Contract cost \$6,641,475
 - Cost to Date \$1,446,276
 - Work included removal of block wall and hauling of stockpiled soil from the Sundale Well site to the project site to backfill Pond 3, construction of on-site force main, construction of on-site PG&E electric service, and installation of pump station wet well
 - Work began at the Woodgreen Lift Station site with clearing, grubbing, installation of perimeter construction fencing, and potholing of existing underground utilities


- Frontage Road Trunk Sewer Replacement Phase 1
 - Scope includes 1900 linear feet of 15 inch diameter gravity sewer, 1200 linear feet of 18 inch diameter gravity sewer, and 10 manholes
 - Opened bids July 2025
 - Apparent low bid \$3,777,777
 - Engineer's estimate was \$3.7 million at bid time
 - Currently reviewing bids

Other Active Projects

- Southland WWTF Permit Compliance and Phase 2 Concept Design
 - Work involves development of permit compliance plan to ensure that the District can meet the new permit limits that go into effect in November 2026
 - Work also includes development of Phase 2 Concept Design Report to implement necessary equipment and process upgrades required to meet increased demand and new permit limits
 - Board approved \$474,461 contract with MKN in February 2025
 - Development of permit compliance plan is underway

Other Active Projects

- District Office Generator
 - Coordinating service disconnect/reconnect with PG&E
 - Installation of new service panel and automatic transfer switch pending PG&E panel approval and service disconnect/reconnect date


Regulatory

- Completed quarterly Stage II Disinfection By-Product sampling and reporting
- Completed quarterly raw water sampling and reporting

- Water Operations Activities
 - Initiated operation of Sundale Well on limited basis while monitoring for changes in nitrate level
 - Pulled Joshua Road Pump Station Pump #2 due to excessive vibration, rebuilt pump, reinstalled pump, and put back to service
 - Sampled all 2024 Water Distribution System Project waterlines prior to waterlines being placed into service
 - Connected Westgate pressure reducing station to Blacklake pressure zone
 - Continued to assist with meter replacement program
 - Completed 195 USA locates

 - Repaired 1 fire hydrant
 - Repaired 1 main leak
 - Repaired o service leak
 - Repaired 6 services

Regulatory

- Southland WWTF Permit
 - RWQCB issued new permit that went into effect on 1/1/2025
 - New permit provides interim effluent limits until 11/14/2026
 - New effluent limits after 11/14/2026
 - Will be difficult to comply with new salts limits
 - Working with MKN to develop compliance strategy

- Wastewater Operations Activities
 - Continued 2 pond operation at BL WRF to allow for Blacklake Sewer System Consolidation Project to proceed
 - Pulled RAS pump #2, repaired, and reinstalled at Southland WWTF
 - Ripped all 10 percolation ponds at Southland WWTF
 - Recoated 8 manholes
 - Changed out 12 drying bed plug valve gear boxes
 - Jetted and cleaned Maria Vista LS tributary collection system as well as trouble spot list
